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Committee Reports

Research Committee

The Research Committee Survey was completed by 53 nurses. Only 17 were returned by mail from the Mid-Eas Dropper. The remainder (n=36) were obtained from members attending a local meeting in Detroit or the Mideast Region Fall Meeting in Indianapolis. I will summarize the results. The sample size for items will vary since some responders did not answer all items.

The ET nurses tended to have a BSN (n=33) or MSN (n=12) degree. Employment tended to be in acute care (n=43) or home care (n=23). The years of experience as an ET nurse ranged 1 to 23 years (n=7.2, SD=6.1). Fourteen persons had presented research, 14 had a publication, and 16 had participated in a research project. There were 47 persons (89%) interested in a regional research project. The nurses' comfort with various aspects of research is presented in Table 1. Except for understanding the steps of the research process (M=3.0) and critique a research article (M=2.9), all items were rated as poorly prepared or uncomfortable. The majority of persons stated they would attend a presentation on the topic at a regional meeting.

Table 2 presents information about the ET nurses' ability to arrange research time in a work schedule. The nurses rat-

ed research as important (M=3.5), expressed an interest in research (M=3.3), and had colleagues with whom to share research ideas (M=3.2). They felt they lacked time to participate in research (M=2.6), were not rewarded for participating in research (M=2.7), lacked a research mentor (M=2.5), and lacked institutional support and resources to do research (M=2.4). The Research Committee was viewed positively (M=3.3), but some members did write that they had no way to rate this item.

Considering the number of members who receive the Mid-Eas Dropper, the response to this survey was very low and a great disappointment. It is not known if the non-responders were very comfortable or very uncomfortable with research. The Research Committee felt that the Mid Eas Dropper was the most cost effective manner to distribute the survey. The results must be considered cautiously. Considering the number of positive responses to attending a presentation about research, presentations, or publications, the MidEast Region should consider a lecture (30 min. to 1 hour) or work session on one of the topics each year at the Regional Meeting. Possibly it could be scheduled as a breakfast session or during the lunch break so as to not interfere with the structured program. There appears to be interest in a regional research project. Whatever project is developed would need to be done as simply as possible since these ET nurses expressed little time to do research or institutional support for research. Although several research topics were suggested, the most common were prevalence/incidence of pressure ulcers (n=4), validation of the ET nurse's role (n=2), pressure ulcer prevention (n=2), and sterile vs nonsterile technique in wound care (n=2). The following ET nurses agreed to serve as mentors for members who request assistance - Carol Mikols, West Branch, MI, Deborah Williams, West Branch, MI, Robert Frout, Lansing, MI, Mary Berry, Detroit, MI, Barbara Pieper, Detroit, MI, and Barbara Blaylock, Toledo, OH. The Research Committee appreciates your input, and will continue to examine the results of this survey.—Barbara Pieper

dies, emphasizing the relief of suffering and pain?

For several centuries, it has been inappropriately identified almost exclusively with hospital care; but, historically, nursing always has provided one-to-one care in the poorest

and most deprived communities.

Nowadays, nurses are intensifying their presence in such areas as preventive medicine, as well as in intimate care in the homes of the sick.

Why does it appear nursing is under attack from both inside and outside the profession? Has the honor and respect gone out of this noble calling? If so, what has happened? Who is responsible?

Still, isn't every family in our fair land excited to have one of its daughters or sons in the nursing profession? It remains one of the most respected forms of employment. (Indeed, it outranks the medical profession in terms of public respect.)

Today, as I make my daily rounds in the inten-

sive care units, on the regular hospital floors and as I deal with visiting nurses over the phone, I am constantly reminded of their continued expertise and overwhelming concern for their patients.

Yes, many great nurses whom I have known and with whom I have been honored to work with have

> retired or left the profession or gone into administration. But their places have been taken by a still committed, still dedicated professional.

Nowadays, complex machines are in danger of replac-

ing the nurse and the doctor, but, fortunately, that hands-on philosophy so characteristic of this health-care specialty remains an integral component of modern nursing care.

Without nurses in our major medical facilities, regardless of the level of biotechnological sophistication, few severely injured or ill patients would survive. Far more than the physician's involvement, the one-on-one care provided by the nurse to the sickest, the elderly and the poor is the basic reason a patient will be cured or his or her quality of life will be extended.

We must never forget how important the human touch and compassion are to the obliteration of pain and curing of disease, Even today, the nurse cannot be replaced by a machine.

Nursing is changing and it must change. But it is not the advanced instrumentation that is invading the delicate nurse-patient relationship; it is a new economic virus emphasizing cost-containment that threatens to destroy this relationship.

In medicine, it is fast becoming a religion where patient care is based on economics and not on quality, In the process, the graduate, highly trained nurse may be found to be too expensive for the rapidly developing managedcare health system, becoming a vanishing species.

The nurse, because of cost, may not be able to spend time with patients, thereby being unable to set up proper bonding relationships. Still, can any of us imagine a first-class healthcare delivery system of the future without nurses, regardless of cost?

Doctors diagnose and operate; doctors prescribe drugs. But the hour-to-hour vigilance and care of the sick is the true responsibility of the nurse. Yes, the great health-care profession of nursing is changing, and it must change.

But let's thank God that the nurses are still at our bedside when we are ill, and let's continue to give them the honor and respect they so justly are due.

Membership Rebate

Note: This letter is the response to the letter that was submitted to the February MID-EAS DROPPER regarding the \$12.50 rebate to the region. This letter was sent to national and the editor did not receive the response in time to print it with the February issue.

Dear Barbara Blaylock and Paul Erwin-Toth:

Thank you for your letter seeking clarification of the Board's recent decisions concerning membership dues. In regards to the \$12.50 "rebate", the Board determined that because this is the individual members money. THEY should be in the drivers seat in determining where they want this money to be allocated. Since our inception as a professional organization with regions, the national level of WOCN has supported regional development by rebating \$12.50 of annual membership dues to the region. This was an automatic regional rebate that, in fact, most members were unaware of. We believe it is not only considerate but ethical that we explain to members how their dues are being distributed and allow them to participate in the allocation of their money. 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
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NIWI Report

The 1996 Nurse in Washington internship was a great success. There were 77 nurses from all over the country representing over 20 specialty organizations. The WOCN was represented by six ET nurses.

Our few (not enough) days at the conference were jam-packed with information and speakers. The main topic on just about everyone's mind at the time was the budget battle. During the week we were there, the Democrats and Republicans were preparing for another possible government shutdown. One of the major issues of the budget battle has been Medicare and Medicaid reform proposals. NIWI participants shared a panel discussion session with participants of the Nursing Economics conference with addressed this issue. Speakers on the panel included Sheila Burke, RN, Chief of Staff for Senator Bob Dole (R-KS) and Mary Wakefield, RN, Director, Center of Health Policy at George Mason University. The panel agreed that there needed to be some form of reform and/or growth con-

tainment; they just couldn't agree on how to achieve it. The Congressional Budget Office projects that Medicare expenditures will grow from \$176 billion in 1995 to \$286 billion 2000. This is an average growth of 10.2% over the next five years. The CBO also projects that Medicaid expenditures will grow from \$157 billion in 1995 to \$262 billion in 2000. This represents a growth rate of 10.8% over the next five years. So, you can see that this is an issue that will continue to have much discussion and debate in the coming election

The six ET nurses spent an interesting lunch with Gregory Andrews, who is the lobbyist for the WOCN. Greg gave us some good pointers on how to use our expertise to lobby our Congressional members. He also briefed us on the issues he is currently working on for the WOCN. This includes a project on telemedicine in rural areas.

One other interesting topic presented at the conference dealt with a study conducted by the Institute of Medicine titled, "Nursing Staff in Hospitals and Nursing Homes: Is It Adequate?" Outcomes of the study included recommendations that hospitals expand the use of registered nurses with advance practice preparation and skills to provide clinical leadership and cost-effective patient care, particularly for patients with complex management problems. The results and recommendations of this study created quite a bit of discussion amount the attendees. And, as you can see, it could affect ET nurses greatly.

You Mail, I Mail, E Mail!

ET nurses are great communicators with patients and staff but often not as good keeping in touch with each other. One option to improve our networking is through the computer, specifically email. For many situations, e-mail is an excellent opportunity that requires little or no experience with the Internet or advanced computer wizardry.

This year's conference in Seattle provided a wonderful opportunity to work with computers and explore WOCN's web site. The handout provided during the computer sessions was an excellent overview of computerese. E-mail uses similar methods to accessing sites to send mail but can be simpler.

E-mail defined is "electronic mail." Your address is wherever you access a computer. It's as easy as typing a letter on a word processor. Within e-mail, it only takes a short combination of buttons to send a letter, and it is instantaneously sent to another person's computer. The major stepping stones required are in setting up a system through which email can be sent.

The first step is getting the hardware (computer equipment). You must have some type of fairly recently built computer and a modem. The modem can be external or internal and provides a telephone hookup with other computers. The second step is

finding a software program with an e-mail system in the Internet or another network. Examples of systems that have e-mail are Compuserve, American On Line, Global Network, Microsoft, and others (call any of these and ask for an installation disk, and you'll likely get a free trail offer). A fairly reasonable charge is accrued per minute of use. Another often used email system is through public universities. Michigan State University, for example, offers "free" (I'm sure I paid for it with my tuition) e-mail services for students and alumni. Also, large corporations and federal and state government have their own access to systems.



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
New '96 Candidates

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
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A Note From our ET Editor
